
## Global Service Team Coordinator's Corner

#### **SERVICE REPORTING – ENVIROMENTAL IDEAS:**



It is great to see what Clubs are doing which I can read through Service Reporting. One of the goals for our District is an Environmental Project.

This can be done as a Club, or a community project and can involve working alongside DOC or a preschool, schools, etc. For the month of October some of the ideas that Clubs had undertaken were:

- Cromwell Lions Club have helped out on the first day of a community planting effort along the lake shore. 7,500 native trees planted with the plan to plant 56,000 over the next few years. The Club also supplied volunteers with sausages and chips for lunch
- A Mossburn Lions Club Member worked with a Forestry Gang to remove a Forestry block resulting in firewood for their local people
- Clyde & Districts Lions Club maintaining a garden on their local bike trail Koromiko Gardens

- Cromwell Lake Dunstan Lions Club have joined other organisations in their local area to plant native trees from bridge to bridge
- Southland Girls High School Leo Club have planted native trees beside the seat they installed alongside the Waihopai River bank

- Clyde & District Lions Club received wool from the Kiwi Family Trust and have knitted pure wool baby singlets – given to their local birthing unit, Presbyterian Social Support, Catholic Women's League and other agencies supporting families. Plan is to start knitting other items such as hats and cardigans
- Gore River Valley Lions Club Heads up for Kids collecting old money and foreign money have tins in all the banks in their town. Great fundraiser.

A BRIEF HISTORY OF 202F LIONS

INVERCARGILL HOST LIONS CLUB By Lion Kevin Wall

he Lions Club of Invercargill Host was Chartered in May 1962 and was originally known as the Lions Club of Invercargill. We were the first Lions Club south of Lion Dunedin. PrWhen further Lions Clubs came to Invercargill (such as Invercargill East, Invercargill South, Invercargill Otatara), it was renamed as the Lions Club of Invercargill Host as is the norm by LCI

What started as a male only Club, the largest Service Club in Invercargill back then, it transformed many years ago to become a mixed-gender Club and has prospered with the introduction of female members despite what some members felt at the time. Moving with the times....

The Lions Club of Invercargill Host has a proud history of chartering many other Lions Clubs in our Lions District of 202F over the years:

Gore Lions Club in 1963 Invercargill Borstal Tigers Club in 1963 Otautau Lions Club in 1963 Maniototo Lions Club in 1964 – jointly formed with the Oamaru Lions Club

Te Anau Lions Club in 1964 Lumsden Lions Club in 1964 Winton Lions Club in 1965 Tuatapere Lions Club in 1965 Bluff Lions Club in 1966 Riverton Lions Club in 1966 Wyndham Lions Club in 1966 Waikiwi Lions Club in 1968 Stewart Island Lions Club in 1969 Invercargill South Lions Club in 1972 Invercargill Host Lioness Club in 1976 Invercargill Pakeke Lions Club in 1982 Invercargill Ascot Lions Club in 1992




Over many years since our inception, our Lions Club has produced many member for our District 202FCcabinet and further afield. We have also produced a couple of District Governors and a Council Chairman over the years too.





Back in the days, we hosted fundraising, Elephant Races, Washing-Machine races (in the old round agitator washing machines) and other celebratory races through the streets of Invercargill, we also had a Lion Member live up a pole (30 feet above ground level in a wee hut) for about ten days in Wachner Place when fundraising for the All-Weather Athletic Track out at Surrey Park Invercargill. In those days we did many weird & whacky projects to garner the imagination of, and support of our public – and raised huge donations for our nominated charities too. We had jockey races, horse sulky races, All Black races etc, etc. we did lamb appeals, calf appeals,

sold super-dirt, we painted houses, we pruned forest blocks, we demolished the old manual training centre and bakery in Don Street, Invercargill (with the help of the Periodic Detention detainees, recycling thousands and thousands of reclaimed reusable red bricks and other demo materials, we took Borstal lads out of their prison on Saturday mornings and cleaned windows, did the gardens etc, at Calvary Hospital, IHC Facility in Waikiwi, did many a road clean-up and beach clean-up of rubbish with these lads – until the Prison was changed from a Borstal to an Adult Priason. We even charted a type of Lions Club called a Tigers Club within the Prison – with the acknowledgement and approval of HM Prisons NZ and Lions Clubs International.

Over our years we have supported thousands and thousands of community projects, some initiated by our Club, others initiated by other Clubs, or our community – but we have supported them all with our hands-on assistance and/or our fundraising efforts. They would hardly be any community charitable group that has not benefitted by our endeavours over our 60 years of existence. To name a few, the Ann Crawford Heart Lung Transplant Appeal (the first ever double-transplant recipient appeal ever done in NZ), the numerous other local and National Transplant Appeals, Flood Relief/Disasters Appeals, Riding for the Disabled, St. John Ambulance Service, the numerous Health Shuttles, our international

acclaimed World Festival of Magic (now in our 35<sup>th</sup> year) and still going strong, etc.

There is not enough space to provide a fuller transcript of what we have done and what we have achieved, but suffice to say we could not have achieved any of it without the support and assistance of the Lions Clubs of Dunedin Host and Christchurch Host who believed in us and jointly Chartered us – plus the support of the many members – male and female – we have had and still have over the years, and most of all **our community** which always kicks-in and supports our charitable endeavours.


