



Imagine your Club owning a part of our Lions Clubs Cancer Screening Vehicles!

Facts:

Our Lions Clubs Skin Cancer Screening service is modelled on the Australian Lions Clubs Cancer Institute which has been operating for Thirty years.



The trustees represent each District in NZ. (Lions Club Cancer Trust.)

We have had to establish a Trust with Charity Services and open a Bank account and get GST registered.

Stage two of the Plan. Fundraising.

- Our initial target is to get sufficient funds to make an application to LCIF for a Matching Grant of \$100,000 USD. That means we have to raise \$160,000 NZD to achieve this.
- It would also be nice to raise another \$40,000 so as to be in a position to ask for assistance from the Lloyd Morgan Trust, and other external sponsors towards this life saving project.
- This will give us approximately \$400,000 to get our first vehicle and support on the road. Our target was by July 2023.
- The projects first donation came from our District Ferrymead were instrumental in securing for us a donation of \$30,000.

Professional Support.

We placed an advert in the Royal College of General Practitioners Newsletter and in the first week we had three doctors willing to give us some time.

An idea from the Council of Governors.

It was discussed at the last Council of Governors Meeting in November that clubs buy a bit of the project, and pay for that, or part thereof. All donations no matter how small count. (below are Indicative figures only)



Refugee Programme - a Blenheim Lions initiative worth sharing

In mid 2022 it was suggested that the number of families being allocated to the Marlborough region could rise to around four per month. Since the borders opened in July, the flow of refugee families has increased, however the number that can be transferred from the orientation centre in Mangere has been constrained by low availability of rental accommodation in Blenheim. Since our Lions group approved the provision of a parcel of basic food essentials to each new family, ten families have arrived and received a parcel on the day of moving into their new home. The five families in December/January have arrived from Burma, and follow the Muslim faith. Any animal foods must comply with Halal requirements, however our supplies need only to suffice from Friday till Monday, when the family's assigned support worker can take them to WINZ, and help them to shop. It is probable, that as more rental accommodation becomes available there will be an increase in Blenheim's arrivals. Red Cross gets very little notice for forward planning.

Training will be available before the launch. Starting in late April. So this will be available for new club officers before they take their positions.

Another international catastrophic disaster, being the Turkey & Syrian Earthquake has seen LCIF quickly respond by donating an initial grant of USD200k towards humanitarian relief.

Our immediate action here, and towards other disaster and humanitarian projects is only possible through Lions Clubs globally donating to LCIF.

The grants to Turkey and Syrian come on top of the plus USD2 Million already donated to Western European countries who are supporting the Ukrainian refugees.

Donations to LCIF are all 100% transferred without there being any direct Admin costs deducted, so there is no organisation/s 'clipping the ticket'. This ensures total donations are received by the recipient clubs on behalf of those requiring assistance.




With the mission of promoting international peace and understanding, the Youth Camp and Exchange Programme (YCE) gives thousands of young people the opportunity to experience life in other cultures gaining a new understanding of the world through travel abroad (or in New Zealand.)

In January I was lucky enough to travel to South Australia on the international youth camp, thanks to both the Kaikoura Lions clubs. I stayed in Goolwa for 10 days with my host family and another student from Texas. Both of my host parents are members of the Goolwa lions in SA, taking us to see so many beautiful places around their home. Adelaide Zoo and Melba's chocolate factory just to name two. We helped Goolwa Lions sorting books, which they then open to the public twice a week and raise money for the community.



Camp started by meeting the rest of the camp members/staff leaders and having a bbq, then a swim as the weather was so warm. Marae have especially been to the forefront and ethnic groups have been prominent in relief support. Or is this more than an expression of community goodwill reflecting in all probability the areas most likely to be flooded. But the Student Army has been one group who again have stepped up. The pioneer work in Canterbury has been mirrored in Auckland. But nothing escapes the fact that disaster might be around the corner for any of us. And we know as Lions much is expected of us when that happens whether in NZ or in overseas locations where its LCIF who steps up as International Lions.

We are reminded that any of us can be vulnerable. What has happened in Auckland is a reminder of the need for goodwill so amply demonstrated in Canterbury after the earthquakes. Walk round our beautiful city today and one is impressed by the recovery in evidence. But international Lions support played its part in this and so many Lions clubs across NZ supplemented the aid for Christchurch.
