I The project is co-educational, with contestants 16 to 21 years of age

(as at 1 December in the year of the competition).

All applicants must be sponsored by a Lions, Lioness or Leos club and the official entry form must be completed in full.

Entries close for District 202J competition Monday 17th June.

The regional heats will be held in Oamaru Sunday 30th June.

The National Final will be held Saturday 10th August in Wainuiomata.

All Entrance Fees are covered by Sponsoring Lions/Lioness or Leos Clubs, \$125 per entrant.

The first prize is \$2,500Second \$1,000Third \$500

- Contestants will be required to deliver a Prepared Speech of not less than five minutes nor more than six minutes. The topic is at the discretion of the contestant. Penalty points apply for under and over time.
- An additional Impromptu Speech of not less than 1 minute & not more than two minutes on a topic determined by the judges will also be delivered by each contestant who have one minute to prepare their impromptu speech. Penalty points apply for going over time.

The personal approach to schools is the best method of contact. It's too easy for an email to go to the wrong person, or for someone who does receive it to just ignore/delete it.

Therefore, could you please visit your local schools and speak to the appropriate person, whether that be Head of the English Dept or even the school secretary so the details can be published in the school newsletters; just whatever it takes to get the information to students. Cancellation of the Lions Club of Taieri, Berwick Outdoor Experience Course

was distressed to read of the cancellation of this year's course due to the lack of numbers which I believe is mainly due to complacency by many of the District's Lions clubs who, while prepared to sponsor a young person to the course, don't have an effective marketing plan to promote the course to attract applicants, therefore almost planning to fail.

My club (The Ashburton Lions Club) since 2003 has sponsored at least 6 young people each year to this outstanding personal development course, which has been run by a team of dedicated volunteers for over 30 years. In those years when we have received more applications than positions, we have successfully sought the support of other clubs within our Zone to sponsor these people, resulting in these clubs now being strong supporters of the Berwick course. In recent years the Ashburton District Lions Clubs have accounted for 10 to 12 placements out of a possible 40 course positions.

What are the key factors to this success?

Promotion over 6 weeks:

1. Mid Feb: A Promotion Pack comprising of a letter addressed to known employers of young people, a letter addressed to possible applicants, an application form and a course brochure. These promotion packs are delivered to employers in person, asking them to encourage any young person of 18 years of age and over in their employment, whom they think would benefit from attending this course, to apply for a sponsored position. There are no follow-up visits or phone calls to these employers.

A team of 10 club members visit 60 known employers in total.

- 2. Place adverts in the local community paper calling for applications, four and two weeks before closing date.
- 3. Also advertise for 2 weeks before closing date in the free Community Radio slots.
- 4. Two days after closing date, interview applicants & select.

Post course, applicants are required to attend a club meeting to share their experience with members and to assist with one or more club projects over the next 12 months, if possible.

Should The Taieri Lions Club continue running the course going forward, which I sincerely hope so, my club would be prepared to provide support to other clubs with examples of our Berwick Course information pack. I would also encourage city / town clubs to seek applications as a zone project which would reduce advertising costs, man hours and duplication.

My commiserations and thanks go out to Kevin Moore and his team of volunteers, many of whom utilize part of their annual holidays to provide the Berwick Outdoor Experience to our youth.

Lions National Mobile Skin Cancer Screening Service

LCCT income during the financial year ending 31 March 2024 totalled \$324,108 (including an LCIF Grant of \$124,218) resulting in the Trust being well placed to proceed with the purchase and fitout of the first mobile skin cancer screening bus. Thanks to the following clubs who each made substantial donations (ranging from \$1,000 to \$3,000):

Ashburton, Fairlie, Geraldine, North Otago, Strath Taieri, Taieri and Waimate.

Support from clubs is still sought in fundraising for:

- > recruiting volunteer screeners and setup and support volunteers for screening events,
- > ongoing fundraising for operational costs, and
- > purchase and fit out of a second bus.

When the detailed bus fitout design is finalised, the Trust will be releasing publicity to inform and assist clubs publicise and further support free mobile screening for melanoma and other skin cancers.

ARHCIE Trials Report 2024 -Lions Free Rural Health Check Project

he ARHCIE Lions' Project is dedicated to offering health screening services to rural communities in the South Island. Our journey began with two initial events: at the National Young Farmers Competition in Winchester (attended by 58 people) and at the Timaru Tongan church (attended by 24). These events resulted in 33 referrals for further medical care, highlighting the vital need for accessible healthcare in our rural areas.

Following these events, a collaborative effort involving Lion Members, local health professionals, and community members was initiated to bring the North Island's successful "The Glob" concept to South Canterbury, District J, and the South Island. Discussions centred around staffing, funding, and resource allocation, with support sought from the Bidwill Trust in 2023.

Excitement grew as individuals eagerly embraced the opportunity to participate in a community project to support locals, enhance health literacy, and address limited healthcare access. The project offers basic health assessments covering heart rate, blood pressure, blood sugar, cholesterol levels, SpO2, temperature, and mental health screenings.

Four trial events were decided upon, with the project's continuation contingent upon their success. We secured funding support from the St. John Timaru Area Committee for initial setup resources and 250 tests in the South Canterbury area. Additionally, MTech provided invaluable assistance in setting up a website (yet to go live) for bookings and resource management.

Promotional efforts included creating a Facebook page, distributing ARHCIE stickers, sponsoring a footpath sign by Pleasant Point Lions, and enlisting Annette Bretrauis to support mental health screening. The support from the Glob Team, led by Dr Warren Nichollas, has been instrumental in our endeavours. Trial events were successfully held in Pleasant Point (supported by Pleasant Point Lions), Geraldine (supported by Geraldine Lions), Timaru (supported by Timaru Suburban Lions), and Milton (supported by Milton Lions), with 238 individuals screened. The diverse age ranges and demographics of the participants underscored the project's broad reach.

Forty-seven individuals were referred to their general practitioners or other healthcare providers for further assessment, addressing issues ranging from mental health concerns to diabetes and heart health.

Following the events, plans were made to establish a trust, although funding from the Bidwill Trust was unfortunately declined due to a high volume of applications. SmithBioField Ltd has generously offered to supply testing kits at costs, and ongoing efforts are focused on website and Facebook page development.

A comprehensive review identified various areas for improvement, including enhancing the role descriptions for greeters, providing support for health measurements, refining mental health screening tools, and establishing an efficient onsite referral process.

Looking ahead, we have scheduled new events at rural schools at the end of May, an event at the end of August and a potential event in 2025 already. ARHCIE is here to stay. We will be looking for interest from people to assist with the trust with logistics in their area (South Island).

Numerous buildings were damaged, many well beyond repair resulting in thousands of people becoming homeless. LCIF responded with a US\$100,000 major catastrophe grant to empower Lions in the impacted areas to help their communities recover. LCIF is asking clubs to consider donating to the disaster relief fund.

Ukraine Refugees are still being cared for through Lions projects. In this 2023/24 Lions year LCIF has awarded another 13 refugee assistance grants to several countries including Ukraine. These grants are to provide food and supplies, kitchen equipment, hygiene packages and other necessities including sports equipment and a basketball court. All Lions clubs involved are working with local organisations to ensure the deliveries go where they are needed.

Palestine-as of early April LCIF had awarded US\$20,000 in grants to District 351 in Palestine to procure and distribute blankets to 1850 families living as refugees in tent camps in Al-Mawasi, Rafah in Southern Gaza. As Lions do not have permission to enter Gaza they have partnered with the Agriculture Development Association, a Palestinian NGO based in Ramallah, who have access into the Gaza.

Turkey 2023 Earthquake, this resulted in over 55,000 people being killed, 120,000 being injured and millions left homeless. It is pleasing to report that the Lions of Turkey and our Foundation

Earthquakes, Refugees and Victims of War Update

(LCIF) are still very much involved with the establishment of a Lions "container home village". To date some 98 shipping containers have been made into self-contained temporary homes each sleeping four people, and it is anticipated that the village will grow to 500 containers. Lions have constructed four additional buildings to be used as a day care centre and vocational training centre for the survivors. LCIF have also made a grant to provide a children's playground and a basketball court.

Closer to home, LCIF has made a grant of NZ\$125,000 towards the South Island's new cancer screening bus. I would just like to reiterate the fact that in New Zealand over the years we have received more back in grants than we have donated to LCIF.

As with all Lions humanitarian causes, they are totally reliant on Lions financially supporting LCIF, our Foundation, on at least an annual basis. With only two months of this Lions year to go, has your club made its donation to the Foundation?

Over the last two years it is noted that every club in District 202J has donated to the Foundation. Let's make it three years in a row.

istrict membership is the sum of club memberships and as such determined by the activities of and experiences of members within the individual clubs. The clubs provide opportunities for fellowship and service within their local communities and through that fellowship and service and collaboration with other clubs assist in personal and leadership development. The role of District and International is to assist clubs with resources and foster opportunities for working together.

Whilst a club is part of a wider movement, its primary focus and that of its members must be on its local community and the fellowship, service and personal development opportunities it provides for members. Maintaining and growing members has two components, retention and recruitment. In recent years, our clubs have done better, relative to other Districts, in the former but less well, with some exceptions, in the latter. This may arise, to a greater or lesser extent from club to club, from the membership age profile resulting in club activities and events being seen as boring or unattractive to the younger new members we need to recruit. In addition to asking if existing members are satisfied with their club experience, we need to examine how it can be made more attractive for younger people.
