The juggernaut of District Governor Team club visits is rolling through the district and coming, sooner or later, to a club near you!! 1st VDG Bernie, 2nd VDG Alastair and I are thoroughly enjoying meeting you where you are, and gaining a first-hand knowledge of who you are as a club and how you serve in your particular, unique communities. We are also getting to experience some of your club activities for ourselves, and enjoying that experience too, proving that you really get to know people better by working alongside them on a project of some sort.

In last month's Bulletin, I mentioned that I would like us to be focusing particularly on our global cause of Youth in the first half of this Lions' year and there are two important events this coming month that do just that: One is the National Youth Camp in Kaiteriteri, which starts on September 29th and runs through to October 5th. The Camp Committee have an exciting line-up of activities and experiences for campers from several 202 districts, including 12 from 202E. Well done to clubs who are sponsoring one or more campers from your area – you are giving them a great opportunity to meet other young people with similar (and different!) interests, and to challenge themselves in new ways.

The same applies to the Christchurch Schools Music Festival, which runs this year from October 22nd to 25th in the Christchurch Town Hall. As has been said before in our District Bulletin, being naming-rights sponsors for this event, we give an amazing experience to almost 1000 children on each of the 4 nights. Thank you to all clubs who have contributed to this opportunity. Two of the experiences of club projects that I have taken part in also involved young people. They were two different Junior School Speech Contests, organised by Lions Clubs for the primary schools in their club areas. I was invited to attend the Selwyn Club's contest, which had the 31 winners from Years 7 and 8 at each of the schools in the Selwyn area competing for the overall winners. I was blown away by the quality of these speakers and their speeches! There was a high level of creativity, preparation and engaging performance in each of the speeches, and the judges must have had a very difficult job to select the winners.

The second Junior School Speech Contest I attended was in Nelson, where the Richmond Club had organised the finals for the Year 5 and 6 students from their surrounding schools. This time I was one of the judges in the hot seat! And, once again, I was flabbergasted by the quality of the speakers and their speeches. It made the scoring of each of the aspects for each individual speaker a very difficult task. I had to keep reminding myself that these were only 9/10/11-year-old children.

Well done to the clubs who ran these speech contests, and to other clubs in our district who do a similar thing in your own area. I would like to explore the possibility of having the winners of these area Speech Contests come together for a District Final competition and, to this end, I am putting out an appeal to all clubs who run a Junior Speech Contest to let me know some details of your particular contest – age levels covered, time of year, etc.

As well as being of huge benefit to so many young people, these events are also great opportunities for accompanying adults to see some of the services that Lions Clubs provide to provide their communities. Lions signage is at all the above events. I have been asked to speak briefly at each of the Speech Contests as well, and I have taken this chance to publicise Lions as well as encouraging the children to make the most of every opportunity that will come out of this experience. This is the story of a day in the life of GLT Tini. Nothing to do with my role as GLT coordinator.

Friday 30 August. After my 40 lengths at the local pool (for Life/Lion balance) I'd set myself up behind my laptop. I've been appointed as Lions Local Institute Coordinator for the LCIP (Lions Certified Instructor Program) training to be held 10 – 13 January 2025 in Christchurch. I'd collated quotes (Accommodation,

Catering, Event spaces and Audio/Visual outsourcing) from five venues. All these figures plus comments from my visits to these hotels had to be put in one comprehensive spreadsheet for comparison, to be send to Lions International Specialist, Sakshi. This took care of the AM hours.

At 1pm I found myself in the old shed on the Woodend Vet's grounds, making a head start on packing kindling into bags for the supermarket shelves and wineboxes for direct to the public sales. This is one of the winter fundraisers of the Rangiora Lions. Another team had gathered, and prepared, the used pallets from around the district and sawn them up in kindling pieces, storing them in a huge pile of banana boxes. The others from the packing team arrived at 2pm. I love it that this project includes Lions, less able to participate in the more 'physical activities'. As Howard (83) and Robin (93) say: "As long as we can make ourselves useful, we'll stay in Lions." (See photo). I missed out on Wayne's chocolate biscuits and afternoon tea, as I had to get to my next event. The four remaining packers managed to clear the lot for the

At 3pm I'd put up the Lions' teardrop at the no-exit end of Edward Street, behind Rangiora High School where some members of Keep Rangiora Beautiful had prepared a strip of berm for the planting of 65 small natives. Seven of the RHS Leos (the other eight had had exams or needed to be on the school bus) were already wielding pickaxes and spades to make holes for the shrubs. The technical details of planting: compost, shrub, growing aid, water, was shown to them. I love it that this self-proclaimed Leos A-team of 13- and 14-year-olds likes to serve the community like this. (see separate photo). It was all completed within the hour, and KRB finishing off with some more watering.

At 6.30 Peter and I attended a quiz night where a local group of young people fundraised for

a mission trip. (again, for Life/Lion balance).

But maybe this story has everything to do with my role as GLT coordinator?

October is Vision Awareness month. Vision has been one of our global causes since 1925. It started when Helen Kellar attended the Lions International Convention in 1925. She challenged Lions to become "knights of the blind in the crusade against darkness." Her challenge was accepted and since then there have always been programs to address preventable blindness. Major successes include 10 million cataract surgeries and 1 million trachoma surgeries to restore sight. There have been 2.6 million eye care and community workers trained. Over 1700 eye centres and training institutions have been built, expanded or equipped. We can be proud to be part of an organisation that has improved the quality of life for blind and visually impaired people all over the world.

The Pink Ribbon street appeal is on 18 and 19 October. Many clubs are involved in the street appeal or participate in other ways to raise funds for the Breast Cancer Foundation. The foundation is a charitable trust that relies entirely on donations from the New Zealand public.

It is time to start planning for Diabetes awareness month in November. Many clubs have previously been involved in Lap the Map for diabetes prevention. The goal of Lap the Map is to walk a combined distance of 15,000 km being the perimeter of the New Zealand coastline. Clubs can organise family friendly walks and community events to promote a healthy lifestyle and raise awareness of diabetes in New Zealand. Your club might want to donate the proceeds of a project to the Diabetes Foundation instead of organising a Lap the Map event. All funds raised will go towards diabetes awareness, prevention and research.

STRATEGY FOR PLANNING MARKETING – courtesy of Alecia Hancock Consulting

If you're looking for growth in your organisation, it's time to ditch the outdated marketing tactics.

Today, I'm sharing with you the Growth Triangle.

This powerful framework isn't just some fancy jargon. It's the secret weapon of successful nonprofits in our digital age, where information overload reigns supreme.

Imagine a triangle. Now picture each side representing a crucial element for nonprofit growth. Let's take a look at the three.

- #1 Market: Forget the spray-and-pray approach! We're all about laser focus. Define your ideal supporter with ninja-like precision. Understand their needs, wants, and what makes them tick. This clarity is key to crafting messages that resonate.
- #2 Message: Speaking of messages, ditch the generic stuff. Speak directly to your ideal supporter's heart. What problem do you solve for them? How can you frame your cause as the answer to their prayers? Emotional connection is king! Generic content isn't going to get it done.
- #3 Medium: Now that you know your audience and your message, it's time to pick the perfect platform to deliver it.

 Not all platforms are created equal. Are your supporters on TikTok dancing the night away? Or maybe they're cheering on their favourite team at the local arena? Find your people where they hang out and tailor your message to fit the platform. (Facebook is powerful for Lions)

Remember: By focusing on these three sides of the Growth Triangle, you can work smarter, not harder.

You'll reach the right people with the right message at the right time.

LMLCCT's investment contributed to an astonishing participation 'turnaround' from this region, in the Halberg Games - NZ's annual sporting event for Youth with physical disabilities. This report shares just how impactful your investment has been on the lives of our young people (and their families) in this region and the opportunities created by this single project. Able Tas Kids

We are a group of Tasman families who believe that youth with physical disabilities should have the opportunity to participate in sports and recreation. We aim to break down participation barriers and believe in the impact that one great experience can generate, across our community.





Project Overview

The Halberg Games, is NZ's annual sporting event for kids aged 8-21 with a physical or visual impairment. The cost of regional flights is the main barrier for participation, resulting in only 3-4 athletes from Tasman attending in previous years. In 2024, with the help of LMLCCT, 15 young people attended the Games (a 500% increase).

All Lions clubs share a single mission: We Serve. Yet, no two Lions are exactly alike. That's what makes our service so strong. The same can be said of our clubs - no two clubs are exactly alike. We offer a variety of club models and membership types to meet the needs of all those looking to serve. Here, we have a membership that's right for you.

Club Types:

Traditional Clubs - Most Lions clubs are formed on the traditional club model. These clubs bring together a group of service minded individuals who want to better their community, and meet locally on a regular basis. Learn more about traditional clubs Here Virtual Clubs - Virtual clubs conduct some or all club meetings remotely, over the phone or via the internet. This club type allows a more widely-distributed group of club members to plan and execute service projects with ease, and is a great fit for those with busy schedules. Learn more about virtual clubs Here

Specialty Clubs - are much like traditional clubs, but bring together a group of individuals who share a common interest in addition to a commitment to service. A specialty may share a hobby, like snowboarding or knitting, or a common cultural background. Learn more about specialty clubs Here

Campus Clubs - offer students the opportunity to build leadership skills, and create a common bond of service with fellow students. Members of campus clubs may also be eligible for student membership—see "Membership Types" for more details. Learn more about campus clubs Here

Leo Clubs - provide an opportunity for youth and young adults to serve in their communities, develop leadership skills and grow as individuals. There are two kinds of Leo Clubs - Alpha Leos (ages 12-18) and Omega Leos (ages 18-30). Learn more about the Leo programme Here

Leo-Lions Clubs may be formed by any group of 20 charter members consisting of at least 10 former Leos. These clubs are just one option for Leos to transition to Lions membership. Leos may also form charter or join other types of traditional Lions club, More information Here

Membership Types:

Regular - The most common membership type. Our 1.3 million members in more than 47,000 clubs all over the world work to better their communities and fight for Lions Clubs International's global causes.

Family - Allows relatives living in the same house to volunteer together at a reduced dues rate. Children cannot become members, but can participate in the Cub Program, which allows children under age 12 the opportunity to build a lifelong dedication to helping others.

Student - between who are enrolled in an educational institution, and are between their country's legal age of majority and under 30, are eligible to receive a discount on international dues. This is a great option for members of Campus Clubs!), Leos - young people interested in Lions International may become Leos as part of a Leo Club.

Leo-Lion - members are former Leos who have joined the larger Lions organization. This membership type provides current or former Leos, who are of their country's age of legal majority through age 35, the opportunity to transition from Leos to Lions while receiving a discount on dues and other benefits.



Editoria - I trust that you have all had time to read and reflect on the Membership article above and gleened some information and ideas to take back to your clubs. The slogan "Just Ask" is continually being bandied about by LCI, this always makes me second guess the Lions 'by invitation' - seems slightly difficult when a potential new member has been 'just asked' to join, then possibly turned away because they were not suitable. Yes it has happened to some!

On a more positive note, this is one of the latest LCI articles on 'Just Ask - there are lots of different ways to find new members.
