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We Serve Together to Make a Dífference



I can't believe we are almost one third of the way through this Lions year and yet, when we look at all that has been accomplished in that time, it does seem like we have packed a lot into a short time. In the clubs visited by the DG team so far, we have seen a huge number of very worthwhile projects and activities being carried out, to the benefit of their communities. In the club visits, it has also been a great opportunity for covering many discussion points. There have been the recurring themes of membership, new constitution, portal issues, and the difficulty of getting people to step up into leadership roles, even in some clubs as project leaders within the club. We have listened to clubs' concerns and, in many cases, have been able to offer some possible solutions. Some of these solutions have come from other clubs and we have just been able to pass them on. Which goes to prove the value of being able to share ideas, as we do at our Workshops. This is what we will be doing in our Membership Workshops, which are scheduled for February/March 2025. Dates will be notified during November/December so that clubs can build them into their programming for the second half of the Lions year.

As part of our focus on Membership, clubs will be asked to ensure that their club has a Membership Team Leader and, hopefully, several team members. You will be asked to send in these details so that specific membership information can be sent to the people it most concerns. They are the ones who will be personally invited to attend one of the Membership Workshops, although other club leaders will be welcome to attend these as well if they wish. These workshops will be ideal opportunities for sharing past and current membership ideas and experiences, as well as being presented with some other fresh thoughts.

Speaking of membership, it's celebration time again! Our District Year-to-date net growth is +18, the highest of any of the 202 districts. As I have said before, we know that these numbers do fluctuate, but we certainly do seem to be on a bit of a roll at the moment, thanks to our combined efforts. Each of the DG team has been inducting members on our club visits and there are many other clubs inducting members at their regular club meetings. This is a good time to remind ourselves of some basics though: Make sure each new member is paired with a mentor (not necessarily their sponsor) and is incorporated into club project teams and activities right from the start; make sure that existing members continue to be valued, and that there are club activities available for all members to participate in (e.g. may need to have some activities that are appropriate for older or less able members). And, most basic of all, why it is important for us to attract more members: So that we serve more needs in our communities. Keep up the good work!!

And, while we are on the subject of good work, many thanks to all those who have supported the recent very successful Christchurch Schools' Music Festival, by contributing club funds for our naming-rights sponsorship of this event, and/or by supporting the Lions Information stand in the middle of the ChCh Town Hall foyer. I know there is mention of this event elsewhere in this Bulletin, but I want to stress the importance of the Music Festival as an incredible opportunity that we Lions make available to a huge number of children from within our district. There are almost 1000 primary school children taking part each night, over 4 nights, which means that we are making this possible for almost 4000 children over the 4 nights. We don't often know what this experience will do for each one, or where it will take them in the future, but I know that, by our combined contribution to this experience, we have made a positive difference to many individual children's lives, living out our theme of:

The Ellesmere Lions Information Wall (The Eel) has finally been completed. An official ceremony was held on Friday 27th September to mark this very special occasion.

The idea of an Information Wall was first suggested as a Lions community project back in 2017 to celebrate 100 years of Lions International and 50 years of the

Lions club of Ellesmere. Our district has a rich and interesting history of the early Māori settlement around the shores of Lake Ellesmere as well as the early European settlers who moved to the district many of whom were farmers, other industries and services attracted people to the district as well. Where possible we have used local trades people and businesses for materials required. The making of the Eel was a little harder to find someone because of its uniqueness we had to look further afield.

The use of QR code technology although challenging for some people has made more information readily available by using the QR facility on the panels using personal devices.

This Information Site has been built for future generations of our community and people passing through to enjoy.



"Once again in my monthly report, I yet again comment on another catastrophic disaster - this time its Florida, and caused by the cyclones Helene and Milton. Preceding these were the big floods in Central Europe and Japan. All these created an enormous amount of havoc as well as a significant loss of life.

In all these cases, LCIF has provided humanitarian support for the communities by donations of up to USD100k.

Thus the need to continue our support of our Humanitarian need through LCIF continues.

REMEMBER - LCIF 'does not clip the ticket' for admin costs like many of the other international charities. All of LCIF's costs come from interest earnt on investment income.

With 3 months into our financial Lions year, only 3 of our clubs have made a contribution to LCIF. Our District goal is USD30k, so I would REALLY APPRECIATE if all of our 39 clubs would support our Foundation during our Lions year.

HOW CAN WE (CLUB) SUPPORT LCIF?

This can be by way of:-

- Donations or perhaps proceeds from a project
- Purchase of LCIF Presidential Supporters Pins viz Gold, Silver or Bronze (please contact me if you wish to purchase)
- Plus- our new initiative, being the pledging of a gift through your Will; this can either be a specific amount or as a share of one's estate.
- Personal Donation. These are always welcome, and if the gift is in excess of USD1k, the donor is eligible to receive a MJF in recognition. This specific award plague can always be declined.

CLUB EXCELLENT AWARD:

Recent advices from LCI have amended some of the required conditions. One affecting LCIF donations is-

 Club Excellent Award: "Contributions to LCIF to be an amount equal to or greater than the club's membership total multiply by USD10", or Club Five Star Award- "donate a minimum of USD20 per member or USD1k, whichever is the lesser".

MAKE MARKETING PLANNING EASY

Presidents, make sure you have appointed a club marcom (marketing and communication) to drive your club marketing endeavours and aid communication between the members and to the public.

1. **Prepare a database of local contacts** you can use in your marketing (the examples here are from my club region – Blenheim). Include contact name, email address, submission deadlines for future reference.

- a) Mainstream newspapers article, community events page, paid advert
- b) Community papers free whats on
- c) Community flyers such as coffee news
- d) Club facebook
- e) District 202E facebook page
- f) Community facebook pages e.g. Marlborough Cool Cat Chat, Marlborough Today
- g) Neighbourly
- h) Community radio
- i) Community noticeboards outside supermarkets, malls, library (list locations)
- j) District Council Event finda, Follow me
- k) Organisations Volunteer Marlborough, Citizens Advice Bureau
- I) Community LED (digital) advertising screens

2. **BEFORE** / **DURING** / **AFTER** - It is vital that you advertise your event or project with the community before, during and after the occasion. Get people enthused about what your club is doing, invite them to engage during the event and celebrate your success /thank the public after.

- 3. Create an advertising plan using your database as a reference
- 4. Create a database of clear, action packed photos for use in your facebook posts, advertising and articles
- 5. **Develop relationships with contacts** such as reporters
- 6. Learn a poster making programme such as CANVA or seek help from an experienced creator

The beginnings of the "Lloyd Morgan Lions Clubs Charitable Trust"

It had been the custom, at the end of an International President's year, for his Multiple District to present him with the keys of a new car. International President Lloyd Morgan had always made it very clear that he did not want a gift. While driving to the Multiple District Convention in Dunedin, PCC Chairman David Gault suggested to Alex Grieve and PDG John Armstrong that a Charitable Trust in Lloyd's name would more appropriate. The two Lions who convened the fund raising efforts were PDG John Armstrong (North Island) and PDG Ray Carter (South Island). Clubs donated the initial capital of over \$36,000 and the Trust was duly presented to Lloyd Morgan by Council Chairman (1980-1981) Pat Ryan at the final plenary session of the International Convention in Chicago in 1980.

Capital Fund

Donations to our Trust go to building our Capital Fund. The Capital Fund cannot be touched so it grows each year. Already our Capital Fund exceeds \$5 million. The larger we can grow our Capital Fund the greater the income available for Lions Clubs projects.

Income fund

Income generated from our Capital Fund is available for clubs to use to assist with funding projects by way of grants or loans.

Grants and Loans

Applications by clubs for grants or loans must be made on the approved Trust Application Form which is available from all District Trustees. Clubs must demonstrate commitment to their project by careful financial planning and be able to show why a loan or grant is necessary to complete their project.

Categories of Honours

Life

This is the highest honour and is available to all Lions and member of their families and, at the discretion of the Trustees, such other persons whose contributions to Lions deserves special recognition. Framed Certificate & Lapel Pin. - Donation \$750.00

<u>Honoured</u>

Honoured recognition is available for award to Lions and to other members of the community, to include posthumous award, to recognise outstanding service to Lions or the community at large. Framed Certificate & Lapel Pin. - Donation \$400.00

Friend of the Trust

Available to all Lions and partners or those who wish to show their belief in the value of the Trust. Lapel pin is issued. - Donation \$150.00

Benefactor

Benefactor recognition is available to any organisation, family or individual that has supported the principals, ideals and objectives of the Lloyd Morgan Trust. A Framed Certificate is issued.

Company Benefactor donation \$600

Club wishing to recognise an individual, family or company - donation \$300



- Organise workshops, guest speakers, organise events that appeal to a large audience, consider community service projects that align with your club's mission.
- Utilise Social media, newsletters that are interesting, use local community boards to promote events and membership.
- Encourage current members to share their Lions stories with new members.
- Assign a Mentor at first chance to help them integrate into the club.

• Regularly solicit feedback about what they enjoy and even what they think could be changed. This shows that you value their opinion and are willing to adapt.

- Offer a variety of activities to cater to different interests and listen to their project ideas.
- Partner with other clubs for joint events to expand your reach and attract new members who would not have heard.
- Acknowledge and celebrate contributions and achievements.

Implementing these ideas for new members will have a far reaching impact on all members! By making an effort to retain members by making them feel included, heard and valued, as well as introduce new faces to our great organization.

By 'Opening the front door and Closing the back door' we will reach our 202E, 202 and LCI Membership Goals by July 1st 2027. What is your Clubs Membership Goal?

Younger Members - How Important Are They To Our Clubs?

Every Club is desperate for new (hopefully younger) members.

How do younger members help our clubs grow?

- · Younger minds mean new ways of working (but your existing members need an open mind); if the current
- membership is NOT open to change, are they interested in sponsoring a Club Branch?
- Younger members give the opportunity for great succession planning.
- They add vitality and enthusiasm with different perspectives.
- Changes the older members' views of technology or, at least allows the club to better use that technology including social media.

WARNING!!!

If you invite younger members to join your club:

- Make them feel welcome, talk to them, include them in your social meetings AND listen to them at your
- business meetings.
- We need to look at our meetings and ask, 'are they inviting, how can we make them more fun?'
- We need to look at our social activities. Are we doing a mixed variety, or do we need to change what we do?
- If you have a monthly dinner meeting, ask younger members to give a 3-minute talk about themselves.
- If you have a few younger members consider something like an evening of Go Karts, 10 pin bowling or a movie every alternate month.
- We need Lions to be more fun YES! We are a service organisation BUT we can have fun too!
 After much analysis, the best way to recruit new members IS to Just Ask, One Lion in our district has recruited
 9 new members by simply asking friends, family and acquaintances, he adds NEVER Prejudge a person.
