




### GLOBAL SERVICES CORNER NOVEMBER 2024







### Hello everyone

The year is certainly flying past so quickly and many Clubs have started their preparations for Christmas Events. At the end of my Report I have included some of the Events that have happened in your local area. I have gleamed this information from going into the Lions Portal or through Bulletins and Newsletters.

### BUT there is a downside

I am very concerned that our numbers for **Service Reporting** have dropped sufficiently since changing to the new Portal in July this year.

One of DG Elaine's goal for the 2024-2025 District Goals is:

"By the end of June 2025 our District will increase the percentage of Clubs reporting to 80%."

At the end of June 2024, we had 69% of Clubs in our District doing Service Reporting As at 3<sup>rd</sup> November 2024, Clubs using the new Portal, has dropped to 51%

I appreciate there has been a lot of difficulty for many Clubs using the new Portal. I am hoping that with the offer of further portal training especially in the area of Service Reporting that our % figures will start to increase.


Lions and Leos are people of action—it's what our organization is known for. The other side is **Service Reporting**. It is just as vital that we share our experiences and record our voluntary hours. Many Lions are 'doers' and do not appreciate the need to do Service Reporting but this is necessary, not only locally, but as a District, as a Country and Internationally that these statistics are done.

Currently, Maree Hayes our Global Leadership Coordinator is working alongside PDG Liz Murray and PDG Pam Fiveash to provide Portal Training in your Zone. When this opportunity is available in your Zone please consider seriously participating. This is the only way we are going to achieve DG Elaine's goal for an 80% Service Reporting by 30th June 2025.

Many Clubs supported Child Cancer, Daffodil Day, Prostrate Cancer or other Cancers in our District over the past few months. With Lions promoting the various events in their communities, it not only highlights the impact of Cancer but also promotes the work of Lions.





### My final thought:


At the top of my Report I have three photos but it the one of 'Family' that I would like you all to think about. For many of us, we have 'family or friends' coming for Christmas but

It is hard to believe we are now into the fifth month of the Lions Year.

Thank you to clubs that have kindly donated to LCIF either by purchasing of the PINS or donations from you club.

I once again encourage Lions to support LCIF in all aspects of fundraising across our District.

Last year many countries were hit hard with disasters and LCIF have been there all the way with emergency grants and ongoing repair work.

Latest to be hit was Spain.

Heavy rains and flash flooding ravaged communities across eastern and southern Spain, killing more than 150 people and leaving entire villages submerged. Main roads and bridges were damaged or destroyed, and many were left without power after several months' worth of rain fell in the span of just hours in some areas.

When a humanitarian crisis of this magnitude strikes, we, as Lions, are ready to help. Right beside us is Lions Clubs International Foundation (LCIF), our global foundation. LCIF is mobilizing funds to empower Lions in Spain to help their communities recover.

Whilst this is not in our own backyard, we just never know when disaster can strike in our own backyard.

A reminder for clubs to check in with me for their LCIF credits balances as your club may have sufficient credits to present Melvin Jones Awards.

I would also encourage clubs and districts to look a LCIF grants when they are considering large projects. It is important to investigate these Grants before the project commences. I am more than happy to visit clubs/zones if you are looking at a project and wondering if you can apply for LCIF grants.

I am confident that we will achieve great things this year — including our MISSION 1.5 goal of reaching 1.5 million members by 2027. You are the best of our


organization, so be sure to do your part, serve like only a Lion serves, and Make Your Mark in the world.


