Rowing for life

Rowing for life has been and is nearly done in our district. Ian is working on a restart date, now the team affected by covid are ready to go again. He is contacting rowers and support personnel to coordinate the dates. They will start with District E from Sumner beach then go onto the North Island by the end of June. At the end of the row, they will return and row the Bluff to Curio Bay stage with a possible celebration to signify the end of the adventure.

I was told at the Multiple Districts convention that the clubs of the North Island are ready to receive the team and add to the fundraising. Council Chair Steve promoted the row with the song written by Roger Lusby and a video of the journey so far. On both Friday night and Saturday morning of the MD convention the Rowing for life song was played with the audience joining in on the chorus. It was well received.

To-date Lions have deposited nearly \$50k in the Lions trust account. Moves are underway to have an updating total of Lions fundraising on the Row for life site beside the give- a- little total. I will be keeping everyone informed when the new rowing schedule is released by Ian. Please encourage district Lions clubs to continue supporting the 4 Charities by continuing with their fundraising and banking to the Lions Charitable trust.

Lions Skin Cancer Screening Trust

The plans for the mobile screening vehicle are moving forward quickly. The layout is nearly finalized, and progress has been made on the date for the fitting out of the unit.

We have been offered several sponsorships or reduced costs for the fit out including a donation of 2x 360deg cameras for safer backing and parking.

At our next monthly meeting we are discussing a possible partnership which will be a huge bonus for the whole project. The Trustees have formulated questions for the meeting. If successful, the information will be released in a Cancer Trust bulletin.

I am attending along with Trust chair Paul O Connor a Melanoma seminar in Christchurch on May11th. Should be an interesting day and I'm sure we will make connections and have a better understanding of this terrible disease.





Diabetes

Professor Ben Wheeler of Edgar Diabetes and Obesity Research Otago presented his findings at the District F convention. It was a very interesting presentation, and it was mentioned that Lions have played a huge part in saving lives of those in the trial and with the hope of prospective government funding will make a huge difference to many other lives.

There is much less chance of being pestered by scammers. Contact the National post MD202.postmaster@lionsclubs.org.nz. He will issue the club with a custom email address and supply the password. The emails can be copied to your personal address if needed.

District 202F Awards

Congratulations to any Lions club or individual who was successful in the District 202F awards. The Millar Leadership award started for 2024-2025 with the attendance at the District Convention followed by zone meeting attendence. I require the attendance names, clubs, and titles for recording. Lions' clubs who have their officers recorded by the correct date will be given points and the officers attending the training in June. Filing of MMRs are automatically calculated so the worry of forgetting to file these is a past point now.

The Keelty Youth award will also be assigned points from the District Convention. Support of students at Borland lodge has already been sent to me followed by speech maker sponsorship and Youth exchange. Peace poster will follow.

Any service projects from this Lions year are eligible for District Convention 2025, Entries will open on July 1st also any bulletins from this Lions year enter 2 x different months. Winton Lions Club members massive fundraiser effort for the Emergency Helipad

Their trip started at Cape Reinga on the 24th of February with the destination of Bluff. Cyclists Wim & Jeanet Overgaauw and Inge de Kruijf are members of the Winton Lions Club, aiming to raise money for the Emergency Helipad project in Winton. Their friend Jose van der Poel also joined in for the first two weeks and the last three days at the end.

They were guided by the Tour Aotearoa. A tour set out by the Kenneth brothers, you can order booklets online or download an app with the route. Sometimes they had to adjust because of poor weather conditions or ferry availability, but followed most of the tour from the booklet.

The places visited are too many to mention, but some of the highlights of the trip were 90-mile beach, Waikato River Trail, Timber Trail, Westcoast Wilderness Trail and Walter Peak Station towards Mavora Lakes.

Most of the tour went through the countryside, but one other highlight was biking to Mount Eden in Auckland, right through the CBD. They met a lot of people that were so friendly. Their accommodation varied from Airbnb's, cabins, motels and hotels. It was great to experience "kiwi" hospitality. One of their hosts requested not to pay the accommodation to him, but put the money towards the helipad because he said "I will be pleased if I can save one life". Every day of the trip was amazing, especially due to the beautiful scenery of this great country. They were very lucky with the weather, only on three occasions they needed wet weather gear.

They overcame many challenges along the way, muddy and slippery tracks and very big hills. Also going over swing bridges above deep valleys or rivers was an amazing experience. One of the river crossings was over the Maramatah River with the highest and longest swing bridge in the country (141 m long). Also going through the Spooner Tunnel, which is 1.5 Kilometres long was a great experience. Luckily at the end of every day their support team were waiting with cold drinks, cheese and crackers and a lovely meal.



After 40 days they reached their final destination of Bluff.

They would like to thank everyone who donated, sponsored, prayed and hosted them. It was great to see a crowd at South Hillend and Winton supporting them nearing the finish. The coffee cart at the last morning in Winton and with an extra six people biking alongside them from Winton to Bluff, helped them to manage that last leg with ease.

RETENTION

What is the Definition of Retention: **The act of retaining something**. Synonyms: holding, keeping.

Types: withholding. the act of holding back or keeping within your possession or control.

Six Retention strategies:

- Offer benefits to club members e.g. social as well as service
- Ensure your onboarding process is sound.
- Develop a club culture members want to be a part of.
- Encourage communication.
- Offer training opportunities.
- Provide flexible work schedules.

What is the opposite of Retention? **Attrition**

A reduction or decrease in numbers, size, or strength:

Our club has had a high rate of attrition because so many members have moved away.

A wearing down or weakening of resistance, especially as a result of continuous pressure or harassment.

With so much effort being spent on bringing in new members, it can be easy to overlook the importance of retention. Growth can't happen if Lions are leaving as fast as new members are being inducted. Some clubs and districts believe they have to choose between recruiting or retaining. Top-performing clubs and districts realize they can and must do both.

The three main reasons why Lions drop their membership are

- a) Conflict within the club.
- b) A lack of feeling of belonging in their club.
- c) And scheduling conflicts.

All these problems have one thing in common: *we have the power to solve them*.



- a) We can deal with conflict fairly.
- b) We can make our members feel like they are an important part of their club.
- c) We can be more flexible in scheduling meetings by allowing members to participate virtually.

Do You really know how your members are feeling?

The best way to measure membership satisfaction is by conducting a *member-ship survey*. (survey resource is attached)

Remember, happy Lions don't drop. They become more involved in leading their clubs and performing more service. They invite their friends and family to join their clubs. This is how we will reach the target for *MISSION* **10k** and become the organization our communities need us to be.

Clubs cannot do anything about members who move away from the area - **But keep these members as Lions by making sure they TRANSFER to another club.** While your club will lose the member another club can pick them up and they will remain within the Lions family. Get your President to contact the Zone Chair for the area they are moving to and make sure an introduction is made to their new club - they will appreciate your efforts, as they will be given the opportunity to meet new people in their new town/city.

Make sure your current members are happy with where your club is at -**DO THE SURVEY!!!!!!!**



It is an honour for your club to be able to induct a new member - make them feel special but **DO NOT** pressure them into taking on leadership roles too early in their Lions service. Clubs have lost valuable people through this tactic. It is a proven fact that new members will leave within the first 2 years of being a member of the club if they are not happy. Clubs need to think outside the square sometimes. Don't be afraid to try new things if that is what your members want. e.g.

(a club of 55 members is having trouble filling the role of Vice President for the coming year. Two members have come forward who are willing to fill the role in a joint capacity. The club has taken this on board and are thankful they have 2 enthusiastic members willing to do the job)

It is part of your membership chair's role to regularly check up on meeting apologies. A common fault with clubs is members making apologies for meetings every month, and it becomes very easy to then resign, as the connection with the club has been lost. Follow up these members quickly - someone offers to pick them up and bring them along to the meetings.

Some clubs have two dinner meetings a month - is this necessary? With the times the way they are, this could be an un-necessary burden the club is placing on their members. Why not review it - again the membership survey will address this.


