Health tip this month is about Sleep

During deep sleep, memories are consolidated, learning and emotions process, physical recovery takes place, blood sugar levels and metabolism balance out, your immune system is energized, and your brain detoxifies. Without deep sleep, these functions cannot take place and the symptoms of sleep deprivation kick in.

Sleep time decreases on average by 27 minutes per decade from mid-life until the eighth decade. Compared with younger adults, the older person spends more time in bed but have deterioration in both the quality and quantity of sleep. This can lead to excessive daytime sleepiness, which in turn can lead to intentional and unintentional napping.

Sleep Hygiene Rules

1. Do not spend too much time in bed
2. Maintain a consistent sleep/wake time
3. Get out of bed if unable to fall asleep
4. Restrict naps to 30 minutes in the late morning or early afternoon
5. Exercise regularly
6. Spend more time outside, especially late in the day
7. Increase overall light exposure
8. Eat a light snack (i.e. milk, bread) before bed
9. Avoid caffeine, tobacco, and alcohol after lunch

Yep, Christmas is looming and its time to get organised for Lions Christmas Cake sales. If you have not already done so, make sure your Lions Club has completed the simple administration job of opening a Goodman Fielder Account and Direct Debit Authority. (See our email of 12 August or our new website - see below. No need if you did all this last year – just use your established Goodman Fielder Account Number. If you haven't kept a record, we can help you).

The delivered cost to Lions Clubs this year is \$70.43 plus GST \$10.57 = \$81.00 for each 6-pack of Christmas Cakes – or \$13.50 per cake (GST inclusive). Recommended sell price of \$20 (GST inclusive), although we emphasise that, other than for direct online sales, Lions Clubs may sell cakes at any price of their choosing. **(NB – This cost price is not displayed on our website as it is confidential to Lions Clubs).**

Last year 122 Lions Clubs in New Zealand earned over \$100,000 in cash and kind from Christmas Cakes sales. Let's do even better this year! That's why we have created a new website specifically for Lions Christmas Cakes.

New Lions Christmas Cake Website

Yes – we have developed a brand-new Lions Christmas Cake website. It's up and running. www.lionschristmascakes.org.nz. Take a look. Easy. Or just [Click Here](#). It contains all you need to know. Indeed, all there is to know. About Lions Christmas Cakes. Heaps of information. We will keep it up to date constantly – so keep looking.

Facebook (and other social media promotions)

A comprehensive Facebook marketing programme starts on 1 September:

- We will push out a video on Facebook promoting the hard work that many of our clubs are engaged with, helping and supporting local community initiatives – look out for them!
- We will be promoting messages to get behind our Christmas Cakes especially to businesses.
- We ask members to get the word out, by sharing the videos to friends, families on your personal FB pages or local Neighbourly page.

Of Prime Importance

- Make sure that your Lions Clubs members are fully up to date and fully aware of our Lions Christmas Cake project. Copy this email to them all. Put it in your Club Bulletin.
- Urge your Lions Club members to carefully browse the new website. Get to know and understand the possibilities.
- Share the Christmas Cake story and the videos on your Lions Club's Facebook page/Website.
- Encourage your Lions Club members and others to share the videos and create their own Christmas Cake sales pitch on their personal Facebook pages (example provided) – and, where appropriate, their business websites/Facebook pages.

So – that's it for now. More to come later. 122 Lions Clubs, nearly 18,000 cakes and just over \$100,000 in cash and kind earned by Lions around the country last year. This year? We'll have to wait and see. Over to all Lions Clubs to implement. The opportunity is fantastic. Let's do it! Yes, we can! (as the politicians like to say).

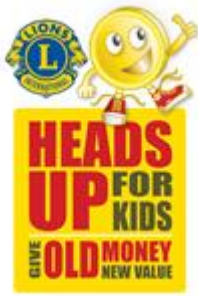

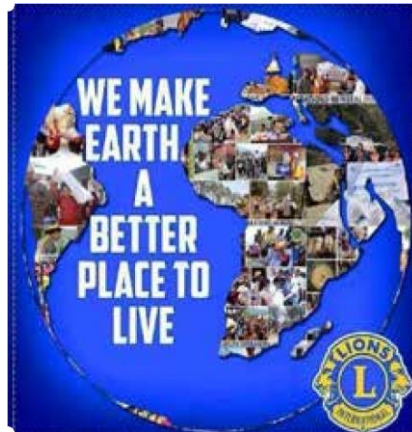


Zone 2 Night out

Lions Club members and Akaroa Community Health Trust representatives gathered at the new Akaroa Health Centre building on Thursday last week for a formal presentation of \$260,000 from the Lions.

Lions big donation fills the gap

The Akaroa and Bays Lions Club have presented a cheque for \$260,000 to the Akaroa Health Trust, towards the community's share of the cost of the town's new Health Centre.

The Lions have raised the sum over five years from fundraising in the Akaroa community, and with significant support and contributions from Lions International.

International Lions funding contributed \$153,000 to the total, partly from the organisation's \$1.5 million donations towards earthquake recovery in the Christchurch area.

The Lions donation brought the total from

fundraising to over \$1.7 million, which means that with the \$1.3 million underwritten by a special rate through the City Council added, then the overall fundraising target of \$3 million is secure.

Akaroa Lions past president Tony Walls commended the community, particularly the people who have repeatedly put their hands into their pockets over the last five years.

"They turned the vision of an integrated health hub into a reality" he said.

Tony added that the work of Lions in this community is subtle, but significant.

This project has raised \$107,000 from local Lions projects such as Paddy's

Markets, Street Raffles, the Lions Golf Tournaments and donations from cruise ship passengers visiting Akaroa.

While raising the money, the Lions have continued to serve by maintaining the normal community activities that support many people, clubs and causes.

Tony Walls also paid tribute to past president Paul de Latour, who has worked tirelessly supporting the fund raising appeal over many years.

They give confidence and security, he said.

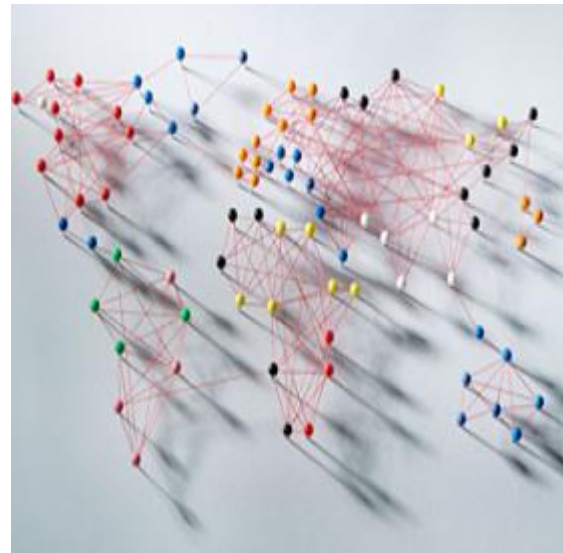

You, the 202E Clubs in the relevant areas, are also the voice of this amazing festival of young people’s music. All Clubs in those areas benefit from this festival, because the Lions logo is on all music and correspondence that goes to the schools, and often home with the students. Check on the website and the item “Participating Schools 2019” to see which of the schools near you are involved, and then pop in to see the colourful poster advertising the festival that they will have in some prominent place, and you will see that this also advertises Lions.

There are 32 Clubs in the relevant areas, and I wrote to all these Clubs earlier in the year, advising that in order for Lions to remain naming sponsors for this year, Clubs would have to increase their donation from the \$250 that has been paid in previous years – over 20 years for some clubs. Thank you to all Clubs that have paid – two of you doubled that donation, most of you added an extra \$100, and some paid the same amount as in previous years, while a couple reduced the amount, but still donated. However, eight Clubs that I contacted have not yet made any donation. The District Cabinet is committed to paying the sponsorship fee of \$10,000 – which, by the way, is much less than all other sponsors pay, but we still get the naming rights and they don’t. The amount received is still well below that \$10,000, but the District has to pay anyway, so the extra funds will have to come from somewhere else.

I repeat my invitation for Clubs to send me promotional information on your Club, contact details, meeting times etc, so I can have it on the large Lions display I will be setting up at the Town Hall for 5th, 6th, 7th and 8th November. I also repeat my challenge for sponsoring Clubs to make a special effort to attend one of the concerts and see where your donation goes.

You will find ticket details on the website.

I’ll be there every night, for at least an hour before each concert starts – I look forward to members of the Lions family stopping by the display to say hello to me.

Forward 1 hour

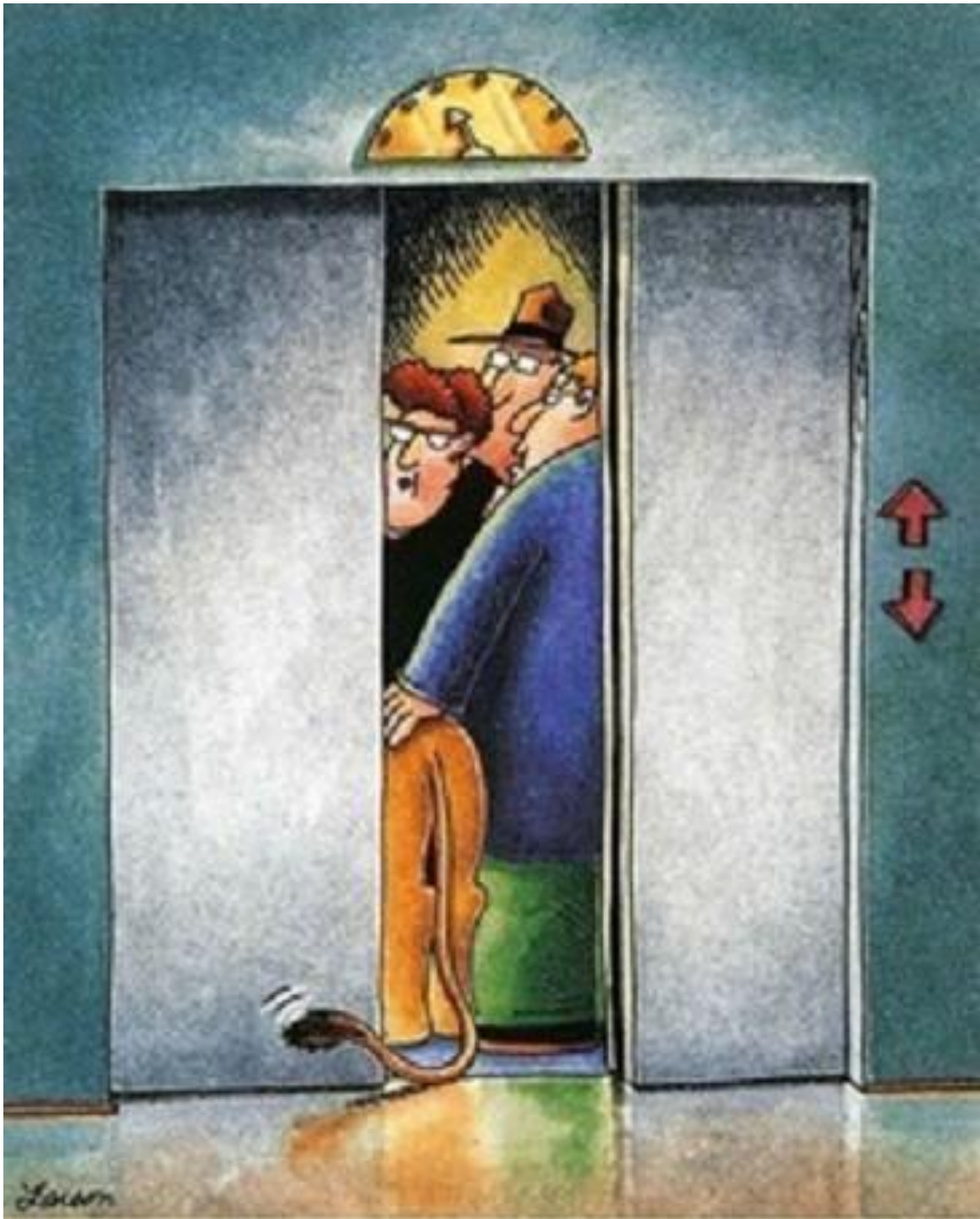
29 Sep 2019 - Daylight Saving Time Starts

When local standard time is about to reach Sunday, 29 September 2019, 2:00:00 a.m. clocks are turned forward 1 hour to Sunday, 29 September 2019, 3:00:00 a.m. local daylight time instead.

Sunrise and sunset will be about 1 hour later on 29 Sep 2019 than the day before. There will be **more light in the evening.**

Also called **Spring Forward, Summer Time, and Daylight Savings Time**
