Hello Lions -

I hope this finds you all safe and well in these very trying and challenging times we find ourselves in under the impact of Covid-19.

The trustees of Borland Lodge Adventure and Education Trust appreciate the support that 202F Lions have given the lodge over the years, and due to these extreme times is appealing for your support again. Lions 202F have had a very long involvement with Borland with many of you having experienced the special qualities that help make Borland Lodge one of the jewels in Southland's crown.

Borland has been providing unique outdoor education and leisure activities to schools, New Zealanders and their families as well as visitors for nearly 50 years.

The Trust functions as a charitable trust operating on a very tight financial line with a small annual profit. This lock down period has had a serious impact on cashflow. We are fortunate with the employment of our excellent and dedicated managers, but with only a modest cash reserve, cannot endure a significant decline in income while continuing to maintain the facility to the required standard. There are no outstanding maintenance issues currently but due to the testing climate and vermin in Western Southland, means occupancy is critical to maintaining the infrastructure. Fortunately bookings are coming in from mid October onwards with a number of people rebooking their time they have lost due to the lock down.

Due to the standing costs, insurances, wages etc we need to bridge a funding gap created by the lock down until hopefully we are operating in some form again. Even after strict scrutiny of all standing costs the shortfall will be in the area of \$35,000.

A collaboration process with other outdoor education providers is being looked at as it offers an ability to lobby Government agencies. To date this has already had some positive feedback from Government ministers and local MPs but will not be in time to address the immediate cashflow crisis. What Borland Lodge Adventure and Education Trust needs is occupancy to create cashflow. We have set up a Givealittle page to see where that takes us.

Clubs could donate in cash or purchase bed nights which could be redeemed at a later date. Any type of support would be most welcome. After this time of uncertainty, a welcome rest at the Borland Lodge facility could be just what is needed.

The Lion Foundation Continues to Fund Throughout Covid 19

Since the beginning of the Covid 19 Level 4 lockdown on the 25th of March, the Trustees and team at The Lion Foundation have provided funding support of *over \$4 million dollars to approximately 200 community organisations throughout New Zealand.*

Despite Covid-19 restrictions resulting in our inability to generate funding, we felt it was important to ensure that funding was directed towards support for critical community infrastructure and services given the challenges facing our country.

As the pandemic developed, the Lion Foundation's goal was clear:-

- to ensure the community funds available addressed critical needs

support charities and other community organisations to get through these unprecedented times.

Our Trust Board and Grants Team worked hard to develop a set of Covid-19 guidelines which we would apply and have applied when considering grant applications.

The Lion Foundation's Covid-19 guidelines:

What	Description
Salaries	A contribution towards staff salaries and wages.
Opex	Keep the doors open – insurances, power, vehicle leases, office rentals.
Equipment	Necessary equipment to provide services to vulnerable communities.
Training	Training that is online and can demonstrate direct benefit to the community.
Animal Welfare	Protection of Animals
Environment	Protection of the New Zealand environment

It was clear to the Trustees and staff that our funding needed to focus on keeping people in employment whilst supporting infrastructure and services. This would assist organisations to be in a position to continue to offer their community services and programs once it was safe to do so.

Whilst we were unable to process new applications, all existing grant applications were reassessed and considered under the Covid-19 guidelines.

The Lion Foundation has always prided itself on operating in a manner which best represents the fundamental purpose of the Gambling Act and to maximise funding support for the communities we serve. The inability to generate income over the past 7 weeks has resulted in unprecedented challenges, but we will continue to utilise our resources to ensure we are in the best position possible to support communities throughout New Zealand.

Last meeting before lockdown our guests were from Meridian who gave an insight into their Community Fund which supports qualifying causes or organisations in the Waiau River Catchment.

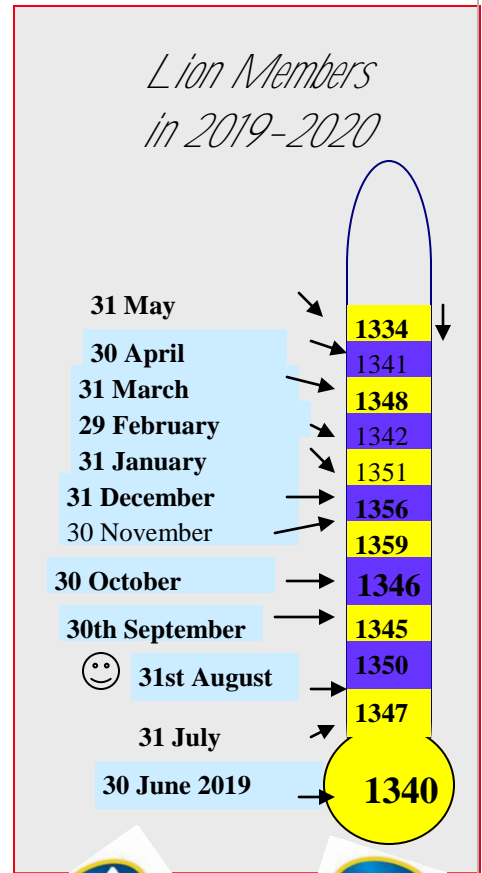
Members were happy to support a request from a local schoolgirl to enable her to travel to participate in s Spirit of Adventure voyage.


